During this 500th year of commemoration of the Reformation, we bring you several programs that explore our common beliefs and shared heritage as Christians. We begin our series with this Conference that explores our Catholic Lutheran relationship through history, ecumenical dialogue and the ongoing path to Christian unity.

Session 1—500 Years Later: Why the Reformation Still Matters, with Dr. Karin Maag In 2017, Christians are marking the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. Yet many today struggle to understand what the Reformation was all about, or why it still might matter today. Come learn more about why the Reformation mattered at the time, especially in the lives of ordinary Christian men and women, and what the enduring legacies of the Reformation might be for the Christian church today.

Dr. Karin Maag is the Director of the H. Henry Meeter Center for Calvin Studies and professor of history at Calvin College, in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Dr. Maag is the author of several books including, Lifting Hearts to the Lord: Worship with John Calvin in Sixteenth-Century Geneva (Eerdmans, 2016).

Session 2— Moving together from Conflict to Communion, with Dr. Susan Wood
As Lutherans and Catholics look back at 500 years of separation—they also see new paths toward deepened mutual understanding and closer relations. This session will explore developing shared narratives of our history, of emphasizing and strengthening "what is held in common," and of praying together.

Susan K. Wood, SCL, Ph.D., a Sister of Charity of Leavenworth, Kansas, is a professor of theology and Chair of the Department of Theology at Marquette University. She has recently co-authored a new book with Timothy Wengert called, <u>A Shared Spiritual Journey: Lutherans and Catholics Traveling Toward Unity</u> (Paulist Press 2016).

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Common Prayer for the Ecumenical Commemoration of the Reformation

On October 31, 2016, Pope Francis gathered with leaders of the Lutheran World Federation to observe the 499th anniversary of Martin Luther's nailing of his 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, with a service of Common Prayer shared at the Lund Cathedral in Sweden. Luther's act is remembered as the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. On Reformation Sunday, October 29, 2017, the Grand Rapids area community will share that same Common Prayer service at the Cathedral of St. Andrew with Catholic Bishop David John Walkowiak joined by Lutheran Bishop Craig Alan Satterlee in an ecumenical observance of all that binds us as 21st century people of faith. The Diocesan Choir will be joined by choir members from Grand Rapids area Lutheran churches and others in a shared worship observance that will include homilies offered by both bishops. The greater Grand Rapids area community is welcome to share in this historical worship gathering.

The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation coincides with 50 years of intentional Catholic Lutheran Dialogue. Dr. Kathryn Johnson and Rev. Brian Daley were members of the ecumenical task force for the "Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry, and Eucharist," which identifies agreements already reached in dialogues between Catholics and Lutherans on those topics. The heart of the *Declaration* is the "Statement of Agreements," which draws together 32 consensus statements, where Catholics and Lutherans have already said there are not church-dividing differences between them. Rev. Daley and Dr. Johnson will be discussing a more tentative section of the *Declaration* that identifies some remaining differences, suggesting ways forward to greater consensus and unity.

Rev. Brian E. Daley, SJ, is a Jesuit priest He is currently the Catherine F. Huisking Professor of Theology at the University of Notre Dame and was the recipient of a Ratzinger Prize for Theology in 2012. He has been involved in the North American Orthodox-Catholic Dialogue since 1981, and was recently part of the ecumenical commission that created the Lutheran-Catholic document, "Declaration on the Way."

Dr. Kathryn Johnson has been director for ecumenical and inter-religious relations in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America church wide office since 2015. She has worked also at the Lutheran World Federation office in Geneva and as a church historian at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary.
